On Thursday evening we held a safeguarding meeting for staff and governors. We took part in training led by Ben Holmes who is a Safeguarding Children in Education Officer. The training consisted of information on types of abuse, recording concerns, online safety, how to support families and much more. The training was fantastic and we look forward to further training later this year.

What are the signs of child abuse? NSPCC

The signs of child abuse aren't always obvious, and a child might not feel able to tell anyone what's happening to them. Sometimes, children don't even realise that what's happening to them is abuse. There are different types of child abuse and the signs that a child is being abused may depend on the type. For example, the signs that a child is being neglected may be different from the signs that a child is being

bused sexually.
Common signs
Some common signs that there may be something concerning happening in a child's life include:
unexplained changes in behaviour or personality
becoming withdrawn
seeming anxious
becoming uncharacteristically aggressive
lacks social skills and has few friends, if any
poor bond or relationship with a parent
knowledge of adult issues inappropriate for their age
running away or going missing
always choosing to wear clothes which cover their body
These signs don't necessarily mean that a child is being abused, there could be other things happening
n their life which are affecting their behaviour – but we can help you to assess the situation. You may al-
o notice some concerning behaviour from adults who you know have children in their care, which makes

you concerned for the child/ children's safety and wellbeing.

If you have any concerns about the safety and/or welfare of a child of young person, telephone Children's Social Care on 0300 123 6720. You could also contact a member of the Senior Leadership Team by phone or by coming into school. If it outside the school please do not wait if you have concerns. Please ring Children's Social Care or the police if appropriate.
