Staff at St George's are constantly updating their knowledge of Safeguarding. As part of this ongoing training, we read the relevant sections of Keeping Children Safe in Education annually.

Keeping Children Safe in Education 2022 is a statutory guidance document which sets out what schools and colleges must do in order to safeguard children. It is a very important, and large document that governors, leaders and school staff need to be aware of. It is separated into five parts and several annexes:

- 1. Safeguarding information for all staff ALL staff including volunteers MUST read this OR Annex A
- 2. The management of safeguarding leaders, governors and DSLs should familiarise themselves with this part
- 3. Safer recruitment ALL those involved in the recruitment of staff and the SCR should read this
- 4. Safeguarding concerns and allegations made about staff leaders, Chair of Governors and DSLs should be aware
- 5. Child-on-child sexual violence and sexual harassment leaders and DSLs should read this part KCSIE is updated at least annually and this updated version comes into force from the 1st September 2022. This means that all policies, procedures and practice relating to safeguarding in schools must be reviewed in light of this update.


Over the recent weeks, all staff have been reading this document and the school keep a record of their knowledge of the guidance.
