<u>Homework</u>



Homework will continue to be sent out half termly - each half term you will receive a home learning menu. As explained on the menu, you must complete the Maths and English activities as well as one RE activity. The rest is up to you. The homework menu will allow you to be creative and imaginative in what you decide to produce. The hand in date for the activities this half term will be Friday 9th December. Many parents ask if they can help with activities and projects such as this and the answer is most definitely a resounding 'yes'! There is nothing more motivating for a child than an interested adult. The Homework menu has been sent home tonight with this letter.



Spellings and times tables

Spellings and times tables will be given out on a Friday and will be tested the following Friday. The spellings they are given will link to the teaching that we are doing in class. Please also remember to log in to Spelling Shed at home using the login details in your blue password booklet. This is a fantastic resource to practise spellings and spelling patterns that we have been looking at in class.

Reading

Every child has been given a school reading book, which continues the whole school system for colour bands. As a junior, your child has the responsibility to change their own book when finished or when they are ready for a change. Please encourage your children to write the books they have read into their reading record, so that they can be proud of their reading achievements and even achieve one of the reading challenge certificates! Children should continue to read aloud to an adult as much as possible. They should focus on reading for meaning – predicting what will happen in the story and why, and also thinking about the characters feelings. As your child progresses through school, it is still a vital part of their learning that you hear them read aloud daily. Naturally, the focus changes and you are no longer working on building up fluency and expression but looking at prediction, deduction and inference. Questions such as 'What do you think . . . will do next?' 'What could happen here?' 'Why is . . . behaving like that?' will help children to develop their higher order reading skills. Please could you continue to

sign and comment in the reading journal - it really helps!

This term we are introducing independent reading time twice a week to encourage a love of reading and to share our books with one another. Please make sure your child has their reading book and journal in school every day so they can read and share with everyone.

Please find below our focus for English and Maths this Half Term

<u>English</u>



In English we will continue reading a range of non-chronological reports, identifying and analysing the features of this text type before writing our own on a living thing and their habitat and then on the Anglo-Saxons. We will then be working towards writing our own historical story, using 'Black Powder' by Ally Sherrick as inspiration for our own writing. Whilst reading, we will be using lots of active reading strategies to make comparisons within the text, infer characters' feelings and thoughts and predict what might happen. Throughout our reading of the story, we will also be finding and writing our own complex sentences that use adverb openers as well as re-visiting how

to use speech in our stories.

Later on in the half term we will move onto a non-fiction unit, which this half term will be biographies. We will explore the lives of inspirational and influential people from the past in our reading and writing resulting in the children producing their own biography using the features identified in our reading.

<u>Maths</u>

This half term we will continue to work through the Year 4 Maths curriculum, focusing on practical activities and deeper understanding of mathematical concepts. During this half term the children will explore multiplication and division facts. They will start by working on multiplying by 6, 7, 9, 11 and 12 and related division, before moving onto multiplying and dividing by 2 and 3 digit numbers, and word problems. You can help by supporting your child to learn their times tables **fluently up to 12×12**. This is integral to procedural methods throughout the curriculum. Don't forget to log onto 'MyMaths' to see your weekly homework which will support what we are doing in class and to log into Times Table Rock Stars (aim for an average of 20 minutes a week - just a few minutes each day!).






The Half Term Ahead
